### IRS Mileage Reimbursement CHANGE 2016

As a reminder to our members, each year the IRS updates the standard mileage rate as it allows for reimbursement of business related miles. The IRS has announced that the 2017 standard mileage rate for transportation expenses will be 53.5 cents per mile for all miles related to business use, down from \$0.54 in 2016.

The LMCC will review the bids and award the service contract at its meeting on February 22, 2017.

Any projects estimated over \$6,000.00 will be offered to all member contractors for bid. A clear explanation of what is to be included in the quote along with deadlines will be clearly established and sent to all contractors. The contractors should notify the Chapter of the interest in quoting for the project. Any clarifications that have requested for the project will be provided to all contractors who have expressed interest in submitting a quote. All contractors who have expressed interest in providing a quote will be contacted two days prior to the bid deadlines if a quote has not been received by the Chapter office.

A minor fall may only result in bruised pride, however Winter weather is here and walking on snow and ice covered sidewalks cause a substantial the potential is always there for serious injuries, such as broken bones or even fatal injuries. - Wear proper footwear. A boot with good rubber treads is recommended.
- Walk slowly and deliberately. Tap your foot on possible slippery areas to gauge the level of slickness. Proceed with caution.

- Watch out for black ice.
- Exercise caution when getting in and out of vehicles.
